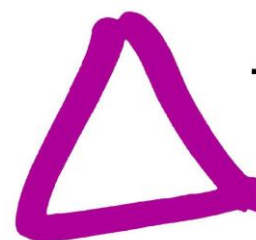

I am a qualified social worker and have worked in services to disabled children since 1983, primarily in social care settings. My expertise is with children and young people with learning disability; in direct assessment; in the assessment of parenting capacity and risk, and in the development and provision of individual packages of support.

I became an associate of Triangle in 2002, leading and contributing to a range of consultancy projects and also delivering training on safeguarding and communication to multiagency audiences. I became a co-director of Triangle in 2007 and continue to teach and consult on a wide range of issues relating to disabled children.

I managed a variety of social work teams and services for West Sussex County Council and since 1997 have worked for East Sussex County Council, establishing a dedicated service for disabled children, including social work teams and residential respite provision,

I now manage all services to disabled children provided by East Sussex County Council, including social work teams, locality and duty teams, fostering, outreach, play schemes and extended school services, residential provision, and paediatric occupational therapy services.
